Letter from Sheltering Hands President

Our feline friends have a rich history. In 2007, the author of a study published in the research journal *Science* declared all domestic cats descended from a Middle Eastern wildcat, and that the process of domestication began 12,000 years ago in the Near East; precisely when the first agricultural society began to flourish in the Middle East's Fertile Crescent, and when the once wild cats became a welcome presence as a result of their protection of stored surplus crops from rodents.

Cats were highly revered by the Egyptians, and those convicted of killing a cat were often sentenced to death. The cat was the symbol of liberty to the Ancient Romans. In the Far East, cats protected treasured manuscripts from rodents.

For reasons unknown, Europeans began to demonize cats during the Middle Ages, associating them with witchcraft and the devil. Their unfounded superstitions resulted in the mass killing of cats and ultimately the death of 25 million Europeans to the Bubonic Plague, spread by uncontrolled flea-carrying rats.

Cats are again extremely popular and according to the 2017-2018 edition of the AVMA *Pet Ownership and Demographics Sourcebook*, cats are the second most popular pet in U.S. households. But superstitions and stereotypes still exist. Asian, French, Scottish and Japanese cultures have positive superstitions about black cats.

But it's a different story in the U.S. Sadly, a UC Berkley study supports what U.S. shelters and rescues have known for years; black cats are unfairly stereotyped and because of this, are far less likely to be adopted than cats of other colors, and far more likely to be euthanized. According to Mikel Delgado, a UC Berkley doctoral student who authored the study, while "orange and Siamese cats are usually adopted within their first day at a shelter, black cats can languish for months because of people's preconceptions about their personalities and behavior." However, "there are no major studies that link coat color and personality."

The truth is, black cats are no different than cats of other colors. Each has a unique personality and is just as deserving of a loving home. Well actually, there may be one difference....research indicates black cats may have a greater ability to fight off infection!

Stephen O'Brien is an expert in cat genetics at the US National Cancer Institute's Laboratory of Genetic Diversity, in Frederick, Maryland. His research has convinced him black cats are healthier because of the genes that make a cat black.

Please, when you are ready to adopt, consider a black cat, or two, or three.....

Hello Spring!

As springtime is in full bloom at last, it's also a good time to remember certain seasonal concerns that face our cats namely poison! Do you know all the plants that harbor dangers for our kitties? Here's a list to help you make good decisions about what spring flowers and plants *not* to bring into your home:

- Lilies
 Calla, Peace and Peruvian lilies cause minor irritation and drooling. Tiger, Day, Asiatic, Easter and Japanese Show lilies can lead to kidney failure with only a few nibbles!
- Azaleas
- 3. Cyclamen
- 4. Crocus (the spring variety will cause nausea/vomiting & diarrhea while the autumn Crocus is deadly)!
- 5. Kalanchoe
- 6. Oleander
- 7. Dieffenbachia
- 8. Daffodils
- 9. Lily of the Valley
- 10. Sago Palm
- 11. Tulips
- 12. Hyacinths → The toxin is located in the bulbs of these plants, so if you have them in your garden and you have a dog, be sure he's not digging them up!

And while we're on the subject of dangers in the home, those plug-in air fresheners contain well over 60+ harmful chemicals and many of the plug-ins are right at nose level for both cats and dogs! Most air fresheners including the brand that supposedly freshens pet odors on furniture are in the top ten most dangerous to animals and humans as they contain phathalates (pronounced thal-ates), a known carcinogen.
